

The Hellenic Preservation Society's Annual Potluck Dinner featured Dr. Hoger Klein, Curator of Medieval Art at the Cleveland Museum of Art, who is an archaeologist, author, lecturer and educator of Byzantine Art.

Following a dinner of savory dishes prepared by the HPS Board along with the wonderful desserts by our members, Klein presented a multi-media presentation of the archaeological restoration projects surrounding the Hagia Sophia in Vize (Asia Minor) and the preservation of Byzantine monuments in present day Turkey. It was followed by a question and answer session.

Among the topics of books and articles he has authored are *Orthodox Views and Un-Orthodox Responses*, *Byzantine Art in the Latin West*, *Constantine and Helena and The Early Cult of the True Cross in Constantinople*, *Things Worthy of Awe and Veration*, and others too numerous to mention.

### John Boukis' Storefront Theater Opens Fourth Season On Classics and New Musicals

There's a new theater on the block. It's a vibrant new addition to the arts scene, and it was brought home to Cleveland by Greek founder and Executive Director John Paul Boukis. Even the name has a Greek origin: Kalliope Stage. It's named for the muse of song and stories, and the theater produces exclusively professional musical theater. The special twist is the small, intimate storefront theater that seats 100 at the corner of Cedar and Lee in Cleveland Heights.

"It's a very unique experience seeing and hearing Broadway actors just a experience home to Cleveland." The nonprofit theater employs a signature combination of New York actors and Cleveland professionals. The theater has been called "the area's out-of-nowhere top producer of musical theater" by The Plain Dealer. And their recent production of "Cabaret" was lauded by The Akron Beacon Journal as "no doubt the most meaningful musical production audiences will see all year in northeast Ohio."

Kalliope Stage has just announced its fourth season of musicals and opens with the area premiere of Andrew Lippa's "Wild Party," and adults-only look at life in New York in the roaring twenties. Next up is "Nite Club Confidential," an award winning comedy featuring a great score of 50's jazz favorites. For the holidays, Kalliope is creating a heartwarming review called "The Tiniest Gift." Next is "Quilters," a beautiful Broadway musical about the women of early America. And closing the season will be a revival of "Dear World," the Jerry Herman comedy from Broadway's golden era. # The Hellenistic Age (323 - 30 B.C.)

Philip II -359-336 B.C. and Alexander III - 336-323 B.C.

The triumph of Sparta over Athens proved to be short lived. Thirty years later, Sparta in turn was challenged and defeated by Thebes, another Greek city-state north of Athens. But Thebes did not last long either, despite the military brilliance of its leader, Epaminondas. Within ten years, Philip II of Macedon challenged and defeated the Theban forces. Philip then proceeded to take over the rest of Greece, with the exception of Sparta. He was succeeded by his son, Alexander III in 336 B.C., who, because of his extraordinary military exploits, became known as "the Great."

Assuming the leadership of Macedon and Greece, at the age of twenty, and following his father's policy, within the incredibly short space of twelve years, he conquered the whole of ancient Near East, including mighty Persia itself. His empire extended from the Aegean Sea (excluding Greece) in the west, to the Indus River in the east and from the Caucasus Mountains in the north to Egypt, and the Arabian Sea in the south.

But in 323 B.C. at the age of only 32 and while at the height of his glory and his manhood, Alexander unexpectedly fell ill of a fever from which he never recovered. In the meantime, as a result of his conquests, whether by intention or not, he laid the foundation for a different culture or civilization that became known as "Hellenistic." Although the Hellenistic civilization or culture was the result of a synthesis or intermingling of two very different cultures (which Alexander intentionally encouraged) the Greek and the Persian, it was unique in and of itself. But even as it fused the West and the East; it still could not be confused or compared with either.

On the one hand, there was the continued use of the Greek language, but in the common form or *koine* which was a simplified version of the ancient Attic dialect and is sometimes also referred to as Alexandrian or Hellenistic Greek. Science also continued but along a more practical technological direction rather than being speculative as the Hellenic had been. Art and architecture also took on a different and more extravagant appearance as compared to the more simple and unostentatious forms of the Hellenic.

On the other hand, there was clear evidence of the Oriental or Eastern influence on the political and social aspects of the Hellenistic culture. Oriental despotism, for example, replaced the Athenian form of democracy

the Greek city-states themselves were forced to accept monarchial political systems. Extravagance and luxury appeared among the upper classes. Excess in art and decoration replaced the Hellenic "golden mean" "Economically, "big businesses" made their first appearance, encouraged and controlled by the new governments. In the process, the previous small-scale manufacturing shops were absorbed or gradually eliminated. Thus, in almost every way, the Hellenistic culture was easily distinguished from either the Hellenic or the Oriental cultures. At the same time, the "resemblance of this world ... to our own is startling." (See W.W. Tarn)

But because Alexander, unfortunately, failed to designate a successor, his territories, following a period of struggles, were eventually divided among four of his outstanding generals: Seleucus, Ptolemy, Lysimachos and Cassander. For example, Mesopotamia and Syria came under the rule of Seleucus. Asia Minor and Thrace were first taken by Lysimachus, but soon after he was killed, these territories also wound up under Seleucus. Ptolemy, for his part, first assumed control of Egypt, but later added Phoenicia and Palestine. Seleucus and Ptolemy, as well as their descendants, ruled as Oriental despots, even to the extent of trying to deify themselves. Cassander, the fourth of Alexander's generals, after establishing himself as king of Macedonia, attempted unsuccessfully to conquer the rest of Greece as Philip and Alexander had done before him.

Although many of the Greek city-states managed to form alliances at first, by which they successfully resisted Cassander, they were unable to withstand the Romans when they appeared in Greece, following their defeating the Carthaginians. Between 146 and 30 B.C., the Romans succeeded in subordinating not only Greece, but most of the former Hellenistic territories and turning them into client states of Rome.
